What's Blooming at Christ Church, Meaford, September 10th, 2025

Hosta plantaginea, Plantain Lily is blooming in the Memorial Garden at Christ Church. There are over 7,200 officially registered Hosta cultivars. It is estimated that of the total number of varieties, including older and unofficial ones can be as high as 10,000 or more. Beyond the cultivars, there are approximately 70 different species. The genus Hosta was given its name in honour of Austrian botanist Nicholas Thomas Host. Like many common names that can be misleading, the Plantain Lily is not a true Lily. It was at one time in the Liliaceae family but now is in the plant family Asparagaceae. This is interesting because they were initially cultivated in Asia not only for their broad attractive foliage, but also as a food source. The sharp tipped sprouts were harvested in the spring similar to Asparagus. Hostas have been used in traditional Chinese, Japanese and Korean medicine for their antiinflammatory, analgesic and antioxidant properties. In horticulture Hostas are very popular for their beautiful foliage and a wide range

of options for shade gardens. The pure white trumpet shaped flowers measure 4-6 inches in length and can have an orange blossom like scent. The flowers appear on sturdy stalks that extend 30 inches above the large shiny leaves. Hosta plantaginea is the latest blooming Hosta, starting in August in most regions or even in early September, and the flowers last nearly a month. Flowers open late in the day as well, at the end of the afternoon, then stay open all night. *Hosta plantagi*nea is the most southerly species of Hostas, found in mild climates in China, although very hardy in our Canadian climates (Ag Can zone 4). The most obvious difference is that it produces new leaves in flushes throughout the summer, not only all at once in the spring like other Hostas. That means any damaged or tired leaves are eventually covered up by fresh new ones. Unlike most Hostas, it produces new leaves in flushes throughout the summer, not only all at once in the spring like other Hostas. Any damaged or tired leaves are therefore eventually covered up by fresh new ones. Also, it sprouts earlier in the spring than other Hostas. Also, the Plantain Lily, unlike other Hostas, prefers full sun or only part shade. It will tolerate full shade, but is less likely to bloom under those lower light conditions. Hosta plantaginea like most Hostas will tolerate

almost any kind of soil as long as it is well-drained. Hostas do best in rich, moist soils. They can tend to wilt during periods of drought, especially while it is in bloom. Like all perennials Hostas will eventually need dividing as the original center of the plant dies out, creating a doughnut shaped plant. Division can be done spring or fall. Large, well established clumps may require an axe to split the root mass.
