# What's Blooming at Christ Church, Meaford, September 17<sup>th</sup>, 2025?

Hydrangea paniculata Quick Fire, or Quick Fire Hydrangea is grown as a standard (small single-stemmed tree) in the southeast corner of the labyrinth. Like most Hydrangea it tolerates full sun to partial shade. Although this specimen is trained to a stake as a small single trunk tree, to fit its location in the labyrinth, growers suggest it is best grown as a large, multi-stemmed shrub. It displays best in a shrub form if regularly pruned to height between 6 to 10 feet tall. This is one of the most winter hardy of the Hydrangeas of which there approximately 75 species. It does well in urban conditions.

Hydrangea paniculata are commonly called panicle hydrangea and are vigorous, upright and rapid-growing shrubs. They are native to China and Japan, and can grow 8-15 feet tall if not

pruned regularly.

The dark green leaves are more or less oval to ovate and the 6-8 inch flower clusters or panicles form at the tips of the branches and bloom from mid-summer into the fall. The cone shaped flower clusters appear first as green and then transition to white before turning to pink in the fall.

Not all Hydrangeas are pruned the same. Paniculata varieties bloom on the current year's growth and so need to be pruned as needed in the late winter to early spring. Other varieties of Hydrangea such as the macrophylla, or large leafed varieties, bloom on the previous years growth, so therefore should not be pruned too late in the season to avoid pruning off the next season flower buds. Larger flower panicles can be obtained by thinning the number of primary shoots to 5-10 branches. When in full bloom, the weight of the flower panicles, especially after a rain shower, can cause the branches to arch downward.

The genus name Hydrangea comes from the Greek, hydor meaning water as in the root of many English words including hydro and aggeion meaning vessel, which is in reference to the cup-like seed bearing fruit. Paniculata refers to the arrangement of the flowers in panicles, which are branched clusters of flowers, where the flowers are arranged on branches off a main stem in a loose, elongated shape.

The specimen at Christ Church is grown as an accent plant, but this variety is also effective if grown in groupings in a mixed shrub border or as a flowering hedge.
